

## Big Business Spent Tens of Millions Lobbying for Extreme Bills Intended to Block People's Legal Rights to Seek Justice Against Corporate Recklessness and Medical Malpractice

March 10, 2017 – According to federal lobbying disclosures, corporate interests, led by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, lobbied far more than any other lobbying groups to push extreme legislation intended to deny peoples' legal rights to seek justice against corporate recklessness and medical malpractice.

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce with its Institute for Legal Reform (ILR) reported as much as \$107 million on lobbying efforts including bills to undermine victims' rights, leading lobbying spending for these bills. While the Chamber's lobbying encompasses a vast array of issues, only a fraction of which includes civil justice, the Chamber's Institute for Legal Reform places a special emphasis on these bills.

<sup>\*</sup> These amounts are calculated by adding the lobbying spending totals from quarterly reports that disclosed lobbying activity on the above bills. These quarterly reports indicate that these groups were lobbying on many different subjects, and as such, we do not know how much of this money was spent specifically on lobbying for the above bills.
